8. Balancing the Past and Present: Gnosticism, the Canon, and Church Order (2nd-3rd Centuries)

This chapter asks how Christians in the second and third centuries stayed faithful to God's past revelation while facing new needs. Under pressure from false teachings—especially Gnosticism—the church developed a canon of Scripture, a Rule of Faith, and stronger overseers. It traces both the gains and the excesses of these changes.

- Gnosticism taught that the physical world was evil and only the spiritual was pure, so it denied Christ's true humanity. Christians rejected this, insisting salvation renews the body, not escapes it.
- Marcion cut the God of the Old Testament out of the faith and made the first list of 'Scripture'—only edited Luke and ten of Paul's letters. He was excluded as a heretic.
- Origen fought Gnostics but still borrowed Greek philosophy, promoting allegorical readings and prizing celibacy over marriage—showing Gnosticism's lasting mark.

- The canon formed by three tests: connection to an eyewitness apostle, wide use among churches, and agreement with known truth. About twenty books were accepted from the start.
- The Rule of Faith (baptismal questions answering Marcion) grew into what we call the Apostles' Creed—affirming God as Ruler of all, Christ's real birth and death, and resurrection of the flesh.
- Overseers (bishops) gained power as guardians of apostolic teaching, but some overstepped—Victor cut off eastern churches over the date of Easter.
- The Montanists (New Prophets) rightly stressed the Spirit and holiness but made false predictions and demanded rules stricter than Scripture.
- The church's holiness rests not in its bishops or in individual experiences, but in faithfulness to the apostolic testimony preserved in Scripture.
