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Mighty Prevailing Prayer: Experiencing the Power of Answered Prayer

9. Chapter 6 — Your Welcome to the Throne

This chapter frames all prayer as approaching God's throne, and teaches that believers not only have instant access to that throne but are actually seated with Christ on it. From that position they intercede with real authority. It explains how to approach and what 'throne life' looks like in practice.

Key takeaways

- Prayer is a privilege, not a casual act — God grants constant, instant access to His throne and wants you to use it.
- Approach the throne five ways: as a throne of grace, with confident boldness, with openness and honesty, with faith (as royalty, not a beggar), and with love and joy.

- Enthroned intercessors are humble and normal in daily life — hidden saints whose power is with God, not on display.
- Reigning in life (Rom. 5:17) means freedom from sin's dominion and prevailing in prayer now, with fullness to come in eternity.
- 'Acting faith' and the 'command of faith' — like Moses at the Red Sea and Elijah at the Jordan — express throne authority when the moment calls for action, not more asking.

Passages worth keeping

“In yourself you are a weak human being. But in Christ you are seated beside Him on His sovereign throne, and He delegates to you the privilege of praying in His name.”

Sums up the chapter's whole basis for authority in prayer.

“You are to reign by your prayer just as Jesus reigns by prayer. Reigning means prevailing.”

Defines what 'throne life' actually does.

How it connects

The chapter ties personal prayer to Christ's exaltation: what happened to the Head (death, resurrection, enthronement) is shared by the body, so intercession becomes an exercise of delegated kingly-priestly authority (1 Peter 2:9; Rev. 1:6).
